

Fifty-nine years on November 8th 1938 Mr. Alec Holly an unemployed miner from Brynmawr fought all day and night a total of 27hrs to save the life of his comrade Mr. Percy Hayward. The following is a condensed report from the newspaper cuttings published at that time and loaned to us by Mr. Brian Holly who is one of our committee members and son of Mr. Alec Holly.

In a fwenty foot deep hole on Rhas Fach Mountain, North of Brynmawr, an area known as "The Patches" Mr. Alec Holly worked in a moving slag heap in a space so small that he could not use a pick or shovel Mr. Holly worked with his bare and bleeding hands digging away the loose slag and heaping it into buckets, which were then drawn to the surface. Once he nearly succeeded. then there was a fresh fall and he had to start all over again. An ambulance, the trapped man's wife her baby, and a doctor all waited anxiously, help was 7 waiting , but Alec Holly knew the life of his comrade depended on his efforts alone.

Although every minue he was down in the hole he faced the risk of being trapped by moving slag

and perhaps smothered to death he never thought of the danger to himself. Because he was small he went into the shaft and, at a most incredible speed, filled the buckets which were handled by a relay of helpers. His eyes red-rimmed for want of sleep, Mr Holly said when interviewed afterwards "Thank God Percy's safe".

Mr Holly 39 years of age was 4ft 10 ins tall and wore size 4 boots, a larger man would not have been able to help Mr. Hayward.

Mr. Hayward wastaken to hospital by car, but Brian Holly tells us his father had to walk home. The quote at the end of one report is one that we can all appreciate "It is queer in what humble places life's greatest heroes arise."

RUGBY PLAYER.

The only Brynmawr Rugby player to be capped by Wales was William George Evans
He was born on 23rd March 1886 and played for Blaina, Aberavon and Brynmawr and it
was when playing for Brynmawr he received his one and only cap against Ireland in 1911
Having acted as reserve for several games his lucky break came when Welsh forward Rees
Thomas had to call off due to a family bereavement.

After his game against Ireland, Will George, as he was known, signed for Leeds Rygby League making his debut against Warrington on 7th OCTOBER, 1911, he then went on to gain two Rugby League caps for Wales
